Franklin County Extension Service Agent Addresses Civic Club on the Lionfish and the Goliath Grouper

Bill Mahan of the Franklin County Extension Service made a presentation at the February meeting on the proliferation and dangers of the Lionfish and the survey of the recovery of the Goliath Grouper.

The harvest of goliath grouper was prohibited in U.S. waters in 1990. Since this time, the extent to which goliath grouper have recovered is not clearly u

understood, and scientists need help in assessing the recovery of goliath grouper populations in Florida. There is a volunteer-based annual survey of this fish known as the Great Goliath Grouper count, or GGGC. If you would like to be involved contact Angela Collins at



There are 15 known species of the lionfish worldwide and 2 have been reported in the Gulf. Lionfish are not native to Florida waters and are predatory reef fish that eat native fish. They compete for food with native fishes such as grouper and snapper. They do not appear to have any predators in Florida waters (See Lionfish, Page 2)

Progress Energy plans for St. George Island

The February meeting had a surprise speaker when Bobby Pickels of Progress Energy came to make a (See Progress, page 2) (Lionfish, from Page 1) and they are increasing in number. Lionfish can not only reduce native juvenile fish populations, but can have negative effect on the overall reef habitat, as they can eliminate organism that serve important ecological roles. Lion fish were first reported off Florida's Atlantic Coast near Dania Beach in 1985. In August, 2010, the first report of lionfish off the West Coast of Florida. In the Fall of 2010, a total of 654 lionfish were taken by divers over 3 days in derbies conducted in the Florida Keys. The 2 graphs below show the growth of lionfish from 1985 until February of 2012. There are 2 little red dots next to Dania on the Southeast Coast in 1985.

Recently, 2 lionfish were found in St. Joseph's Bay outside Port St. Joe.
Lionfish should be handled carefully; they have venom

glands on the dorsal, pelvic and anal spines. NOAA recommends treating a puncture wound by immersing the wound area in hot (not scalding) water for 30 - 90 minutes and seek medical attention as soon as possible. Unless a person is allergic to the venom, lionfish stings are very rarely fatal. Stings can be very painful, cause numbness, swelling and even temporary paralysis.

power twice recently due

It took several days to provide power throughout the Island. Progress Energy will replace the wooden poles with new ones made out of concrete that will provide a stronger alternative to the ones that now cross the Bay.

The new poles will be

adjacent to the existing path across St. George Sound to St. George Island substation. The new line is approximately 5,000 feet to the east of the existing line, in deeper water to avoid oyster beds. The Franklin County Board of **County Commissioners** passed a resolution urging PE to get the project completed prior to the start of hurricane season June 1. Progress Energy scheduling has the new line completed by then, however, the existing line will still have to be removed, and that could take into the late Summer or Fall. The new poles are being installed and can be seen east of the Bridge. This transmission line project is being done in conjunction with a new distribution project along Gorrie Drive. Together, the two projects will help harden the system against severe weather. The transmission line project replaces wooden poles across St. George Sound with concrete monopoles ranging from 85 to 90 in height above the average low-tide water line. The exception will be the two Intracoastal channel crossing structures which will be approximately 150 feet above the average low-tide water levels.

St. George Island Tour of Homes

The first-ever St. George Island Tour of Homes on February 4 had over 300 participants and received very positive feedback. The event, sponsored by the St. George Lighthouse Association, Inc., Had more interest than expected and raised about \$6,000. Dany and Marty Ray organized the event which included docents at each home and many drivers to ferry visitors to the homes in the Plantation. An associated reception and discussion on island-style interior decorating and external landscaping was at the St George Island Fire Station the night before. Terry Kemp of the Lighthouse Association said, "The St. George Lighthouse Association thanks homeowners, sponsors, and everyone who contributed, volunteered, or participated for making the first SGI Tour of Homes a great success." Event Cochair, Dany Ray added, "We had several core chairs, (15) who worked hard to secure the number of needed volunteers. We had over 70 people involved in some form." Vito and Jackie Bell coordinated the 19 drivers needed to get people to and from the 3 homes and club house in the Plantation and Phyllis Lewis was in charge of the docents who were located at each home.
