Update re: water issues on St. George Island

Water Management Services, Inc. (WMSI), the sole provider of water on St. George Island, is for sale. Earlier this year the City of Carrabelle applied to the Department of **Environmental Protection** for a loan to purchase the water company. The St. George Island Civic Club, the Plantation Owners Association and St. George Island Forward combined forces with the goal of postponing this action until enough knowledge could be gathered to determine what was best for the Island.

Due partially to these efforts, the City of Carrabelle has since decided not to purchase WMSI. This decision provided necessary time to consider other options for ownership of the water provider that would best serve the interests of Island residents and property owners. Everyone who contributed to this effort was instrumental in this favorable result. Through an appeal made to

Island property owners,

there is now almost

\$16,000 in a bank account to aid in procuring consultant and legal advice. Thank you to all who sent in money. An organization, the SGI Water District, Inc., a nonprofit entity, has been formed to inquire into ownership and management alternatives for the Island's water utility. This organization has met with several consultants and, as one alternative, is considering the purchase of WMSI. A recent Florida Public Service Commission (PSC) decision was made on a rate increase request by WMSI. This decision allowed a portion of the requested increase in rates (over 30%), an increase in connection fees to \$5,300 and also required that an escrow account be set up to ensure that revenues were applied to needed maintenance and improvements. The attendance at the Park has almost doubled in 2012 over 2011. When you consider Tropical Storm Debby and the possibility of Hurricane Isaac coming ashore, that is much higher than expected. Josh thinks the rating from Dr. Beach of the Park as one of the top five Beaches in the Nation helped tremendously. There is now a graded road that ends in a parking area for 20 vehicles at the easternmost end of the Island. He does recommend driving a truck rather than a road car, but a 4x4 is not needed. Apalachicola Dr. Rhonda Kimbrough Lecture: The History of Ft. Gadsden

Dr. Kimbrough will talk about the historic events at Fort Gadsden, National Historic Landmark 15 miles upstream from Apalachicola, and their international implications. A British fort, escaped slaves, Native Americans, General Andrew Jackson, the American military, and the Spanish control of Florida combine into one of the most dramatic

events in 19th century Florida history. Since obtaining an M.A. in Anthropology from Florida State University in 1990, Rhonda Majors Kimbrough has served as an archaeologist with the National Forests in Florida. She currently manages their heritage program which includes cultural resource management, forest history and tribal relations associated with a 1.2 million-acre land base.
