Civic Club Learns about Hurricane Shutters

"Whether it's total structural failure, or damage from water intrusion, it is very clear that hurricane shutters are your best defense." *David Damon, Owner LP, Pale arter*

David Damon

David Damon used a PowerPoint presentation at the June meeting to explain the different types of protection available for hurricane protection. He said the most basic protection would be impact resistant glass, plywood and thick plastic coverings on the openings of a house. The most damage results from wind and water getting behind the coverings and attacking the inside of the house. In these cases, you must

begin repairs within three days or mold and mildew may set in. The damage done by mold and mildew can match the damage caused when the entire structure is damaged. In these cases you have to attach the protection before the storm hits. Sometimes there isn't enough time. This is why he prefers shutters. There are four basic types of protection: storm panels, accordion shutters, Bahama or Colonial shutters and rollup shutters. Here is some information available on David's website:

Storm Panels – These are individual panels bolted to a track or studs that are permanently installed to the window or door frame. They come in several choices from plastic, to wood to metal. Easy access to the doors and windows is needed because they don't install easily from a ladder. They also require storage when not in use. If you are not in town, you must depend on a very good neighbor or contractor to install. They work well if you have time (See Shutters, Page 2)

(Shutters, from Page 1) Accordian Shutters – The accordian shutter is permanently installed on the outside of the house on the doors and windows. They have a track on the top and the bottom and are pulled together. They have the ability to be closed and locked from the inside of the house which is helpful for homes built on the Island. The shutters are built out of aluminum with a powder coated finish. When installed correctly, they are not very noticeable. These shutters are quick and easy to close and are the most popular shutters David installs.

Bahama or Colonial Shutters – These are similar to the decorative shutters that are most recognizable on the Island. These shutters are very heavy and strong that are bolted closed when a storm is coming. To be rated as hurricane shutters, they may or may not require a back panel. The back panel is usually not noticed when open, but when closed could be seen. The Bahama shutter with a back panel would take away your view but there is now an option with pivoting louvers that would allow more view and light into the house. The shutters are built of aluminum and are powder coated in a variety of

colors. Many owners choose to match the colors to whatever color they have on the roof. They also add an architectural feature to a home as well.

Roll-Up Shutters – These shutters are similar in many ways to a roll-up style garage door. They have a framework all the way around a window and roll up into a can or horizontal box overhead. They are guided by tracks along the side. Doors have no framework on the bottom or sill where you walk. These shutters are operated manually on smaller windows but, because of weight, must be electrically operated on larger openings. These can be manually operated if electricity is lost. If the window opens out, this type of shutter would be required. If the openings are easily accessible from the outside the accordion shutter may be the best choice. Planning & Zoning

Paul Riegelmayer addressed the June meeting and related that a request has been made to the County Planning & Zoning committee to allow C-4 zoning (mixed commercial/rental) for an area between 2nd and 3rd

streets East on the Island. This would allow more of the skinny houses to be built behind the present group of houses. It would also prevent any commercial establishments to come in later. This will be decided at the July 2nd County Commissioner's meeting. It was suggested that members attend the Commission meeting to make our objections known to the entire Commission. Several club members agreed that emails should be sent to all the Commissioners asking this change not be allowed. It is very important when a group of citizens speak up at a Commissioner's meeting. A couple of members commented that many of the Commissioners consider SGI their cash cow and don't worry about how Islanders are affected.
