USFWC Explains Turtle Ordinance and Penalties

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Biologist Lisa Lehnhoff spoke to a small group of members about Franklin County's Turtle Ordinance and what penalties could be assessed against home owners.

While Franklin County's turtle light ordinance has been in effect since the 90's, it can only be enforced by the County.

Apalachicola & Carrabelle Times photo/journalist Lois Swoboda was in attendance and she wrote in the August 22 edition, "Lisa said that the ordinance covers all lights that can be seen from the shore. This includes beach front and many first tier residences. She said red light filters for stage productions could be used

over lights to provide protection. On Thursday, Aug. 15, USFW biologist Lisa Lehnhoff addressed about 20 St. George Islanders when the civic club met on the subject of sea turtles and lighting. All sea turtles are on the federal list of threatened species. Both adult turtles coming ashore to nest and hatchlings returning to the sea can be disoriented by artificial lights. Lehnhoff told the group Franklin County passed the Panhandle's first ordinance protecting sea turtles in 1997. Over the last six months,

the county received two letters from USFW warning that this ordinance is not being properly enforced. The second letter included a list of 140 residences with lighting that appears to be out of compliance with the county law. Lehnhoff said USFW is now asking the sheriff's office to enforce the county ordinance. If that doesn't work, she said, USFW plans to enforce the **Endangered Species Act** (ESA) on St. George Island. FSU Marine Lab Associate to Speak Dr. William Herrnkind, a Professor Emeritus and Senior Scientist in Residence at the FSUCML, (Animal behavior, science education and outreach) will speak about the behavior and natural history of panhandle habitats and organisms. There are interconnections among them that many of us will have seen but perhaps not fully appreciated. Dr. Herrnkind was instrumental in fighting the St. Joe takeover of the property where the FSU Lab stands.

Summer Bingo Ends

The SGI Civic Club ended summer bingo after the second Tuesday in August. The Civic Club sponsored Bingo has made over \$9,000 this year. We averaged around 180 in attendance this summer until August when that dropped below 50 people. On two occasions we had to turn people away (only 200 allowed). County law requires that both interior and exterior light be completely shielded so that neither the bulb nor its reflection can be seen by nesting sea turtles and hatchlings. The county is also supposed to see that lighting fixtures and window treatments are compliant for all construction that occurs seaward of the Coastal Construction Control Line. Violations of the county ordinance are punishable as misdemeanors with a fine of up to \$500 a day and up to 60 days in the county jail." Members Adele Colston, Dany Ray and Sherri Roberts related that when they volunteered at the SGI Visitor's Center, they passed out red filters to attach to flashlights. Lisa told the members to check out lighting stores for the red filters used by stage productions and photographers and cut them to fit. Several members asked about an ordinance to darken the Island and she said she would like that, but that would have to be done by the Franklin County Commission. 
