Mason Bean, who chairs both committees, first addressed how our treasury could be used to improve the Island and various charity groups. One of the objectives of the St. George Island Civic Club

is to improve the Island itself and make it more attractive to our visitors. He spoke of the dune walkovers to the beach. landscaping around the Lighthouse and Welcome Sign and also the irrigation system. The committee proposed more landscaping around the center of the Island adding 30 palm trees to the parking areas in the center of the Island. That would cost approximately \$3,000. He also mentioned donating \$1,000 to the Franklin County Library and another \$1,000 to the Franklin County Humane Society. The remainder of the money (around \$3,000) would be voted on during our December meeting. The nominating committee for officers for 2014 said that according to the By-Laws Steve Childers would move from Vice-President to President and President Newt Colston would move to Immediate Past President. Conservation Lecture Series: Sea Turtles



Thursday, October 10, at 7 p.m. Florida State University Coastal Marine Laboratory Auditorium at 3618 Coastal Highway 98, St. Teresa, FL. Significant gaps exist in our understanding of early sea turtle life stages. The youngest sea turtle life stages, otherwise known as the "lost years", are the most difficult to study due to the turtles' size, fast growth rates, and oceanic lifestyle. Laws and treaties mandate the recovery of these endangered or threatened animals. Species recovery requires that we understand sea turtle distributions, habitat use, and population dynamics across all life stages-from hatchling


to adult; later sea turtle life stages are necessarily dependent on the survival of the earliest life stages. Yet the dispersal and habitat use of young oceanic sea turtles are largely inferred rather than directly observed or quantified. Existing data are few and based on laborintensive visual observations or opportunistic animal sightings. Filling these gaps requires new technologies and methods. (Marine Lab, from Page 3) is inviting water lovers from across the Big Bend area to put their creative and environmental spirit to the test in the second annual "Whatever Floats Your Boat" Regatta, taking place on Saturday Oct. 12, from noon to 5 p.m. The overall challenge of the regatta is to create and race a homemade "boat" from a list of approved recyclable materials that is both visually interesting and, at least initially, can float. The first annual regatta included boats made entirely out of materials such as aluminum cans and plastic bottles, and featured boat shapes ranging from canoes to giant sea turtles. "In-between researching the effects of the 2010 Gulf oil spill and furthering our knowledge of the marine ecosystems we rely on, we like to let our hair down a bit and have some fun with the community," said Felicia Coleman, Director of the Coastal and Marine Laboratory. "Last year's regatta was a blast, filled with laughter, fun and a few boats that just didn't seem to want to stay upright. I can't wait to see what our participants have in store for us this year." With race objectives and prizes aimed more at staying afloat then being

the fastest to the finish line, fun and laughter are the themes of the day. Prize categories for regatta participants include the following: Most creative use of materials, First boat to cross the finish line, Most spectacular failure and People's Choice award. For those more inclined to keep their feet planted on dry land, the race will be fully visible from various shoreline vantage points around the Marine Lab and the nearby boat basin.
