County Manager Alan Pierce spoke to attending members of the Civic Club on March 20. Alan began his presentation with the pros and cons of becoming a municipality. The pros would be self-control and some State moneys. The cons would be additional taxes to support the new city: mayor, clerical position/s and a city council. County taxes and assessments wouldn't change. The city could still opt for law enforcement provided by the County.

Cape St. George Light Offers Free Climbing on April 12

Florida Lighthouse Day will be celebrated on Saturday, April 12, with free climbing at the Cape St. George Lighthouse on St. George Island.

The Lighthouse, Museum, and Gift Shop will be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and there will be no charge for climbing to the top of the Lighthouse on Florida Lighthouse Day. Climbers still need to get a free ticket at the Lighthouse Gift Shop to present to the Lighthouse Keeper before they climb. All climbers must be at least 40 inches tall. Florida Lighthouse Day is celebrated annually in April to commemorate the State's remaining lighthouses. A special district is what Eastpoint Sewer and Water District is; it is a district created by a "special" act of the Florida Legislature to serve a specific purpose. The current governor is very much opposed to special districts, but special districts are tools that can be used by communities to finance things like sewer and water improvements. Since the current Governor does not like them, Alan doesn't think the legislature will create one for St. George Island. Mason Bean asked if the purchase of St. Joe Company Land by the Mormon Church would have any effect on County Residents. Alan responded that he did not know of any plans by the Church to develop any of the property. Any development would still have to be approved by Federal and State Governments.

Cape St. George Light is one of only 30 currently standing in Florida.

The glass in the lantern room of the Lighthouse has been recently replaced, enhancing the spectacular views of the Gulf of Mexico and Apalachicola Bay from the top of the Lighthouse. Visitors climb 92 wooden stairs and an eight-rung ladder to access the lantern room.

The April Full Moon Climb at the Cape St. George Lighthouse on St. George Island will be held on Monday, April 14. The Sunset/Full Moon Climb will take place from 7:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and will include light hors d'oeuvres and a sparkling cider toast to the full moon. Cost is \$15.00 for the general public and \$10.00 for members of the St. George Lighthouse Association. The sun will set at 8:06 p.m. and the moon will rise at 7:44 p.m. on April 14. After sunset, people are invited to climb to the top of the lighthouse for a breathtaking view of the full moon, as space and time permit. Cost is \$10.00 for the general public and \$5.00 for SGLA members. The Cape St. George Light is located in St. George Lighthouse Park at the center of St. George Island, where Island Drive (the road off the bridge) ends at Gulf Beach Drive. Parking is available in lots at either side of the park.

Apalachicola Antique & Classic Boat Show Apalachicola will host the 16th Annual Apalachicola Antique & Classic Boat Show on Saturday, April 19, 2014. Antique boats,

examples of classic and traditional vessels, workboats, and fiberglass and aluminum classics will all be on display throughout the day. This festival emphasizes the maritime history of our picturesque coastal town. Special highlights include home-built boats by skilled craftsmen, authentic oyster boats and workboats, antique outboard engines, plus antique automobiles and artist booths. The Apalachicola Traders' Canoe, a hand built 50-foot long vessel used between 1750-1850, recovered from the Apalachicola River will be on display at the Cotton Warehouse and the restored 1877 gaffrigged schooner the Governor Stone will also be in attendance.

At 5:30 pm BackPorch Revival, an Old-Time String Band will play at Riverfront Park, bring your own chair. There will also be a Sunday cruise up the Apalachicola River. It is a love story of Ethel and Norman Thayer, who are returning to their summer home on Golden Pond for the forty-eighth year. They are visited by their divorced, middle-aged daughter and her dentist fiancé, who then go off to Europe, leaving his teenage son behind for the summer. The boy quickly becomes the "grandchild" the elderly couple have longed for, and as Norman revels in taking his ward fishing and thrusting good books at him, he also learns some lessons

about modern teenage awareness—and slang—in return. In the end, as the summer wanes, so does their brief idyll, and in the final, deeply moving moments of the play, Norman and Ethel are brought even closer together by the incidence of a mild heart attack. Time, they know, is now against them, but the years have been good and, perhaps, another summer on Golden Pond still awaits.
