### Advocates for a hired School Superintendent address September Club Meeting

Franklin County School Board member Pam Shiver and concerned citizens Dottye Thornburg and Dean Vail spoke to Civic Club members about the November 4<sup>th</sup> binding referendum to change the Superintendent from an elected position to a hired position.

They each gave reasons for a Hired
Superintendent: The Superintendent of
Schools needs a broad range of
demonstrated skills to be successful in
today's complex educational environment.
The Franklin County Superintendent must
be competent to manage a twenty-three
million dollar budget funded by your taxes.

At the present time, anyone aged 18 and a registered Franklin County voter may run for the office of Superintendent. A candidate has a guaranteed job for four years and is accountable to their political (See Superintendent, Page 2)

All 3 speakers think the Superintendent should be a knowledgeable, experienced

educator, and possess the administrative skills necessary to oversee important and expensive school functions including budget and finance, the school facilities, technology investments, transportation, personnel, and food service. Citizens' voices will be more effective because the elected School Board serves for policy setting on behalf of the public in matters of the school system allowing the hired Superintentent to focus on principles of the profession and management, not politics.

A highly trained and experienced professional can more effectively manage the budget, 204 employees, and 940 students to produce quality education



Accountability is clear and job roles defined.

When a Superintendent is hired, they can devote full-time to running the schools, not running for office. An applicant must be a professional educator.

complete rigorous training, have management experience and have the required certifications before they are hired. Superintendents currently hired in 99% of the nation's school districts and 26 districts in the State of Florida. All of these 26 counties have maintained a "B" or higher school grade.

An applicant can be recruited from inside or outside Franklin County potentially bringing new skills and innovative practices. (See Superintendent, Page 3)

The following questions, answers and statements were handed out to the members present:

### How can Franklin County get onboard with change for better schools?

Vote YES to the referendum for an appointed superintendent on November 6<sup>th</sup> ballot! Over the next two years the Florida School Board Association (FSBA) will work with the School Board and citizens of Franklin County to find the best possible applicant to fit the needs of our schools. A Citizen Advisory Committee will be chosen to work with the FSBA to narrow the recommendations to the top five applicants. Then the School Board will make the selection from the finalists. This process takes politics out and puts the citizen's voice into the process! The Superintendent will be selected based on skills, experience, recommendations and demonstrated leadership qualities. The CEO of our school will be free to focus on improving education, executing policy, and day-to-day school management.

## Common Concerns Expressed by Citizens

(1). I do not want to give up my right to vote!

Ask yourself how effective your vote has

been. The K-12 school grade of "D" is unacceptable and its financial stability has wavered in recent years.

(2). This will allow the school board to have too much power.

The school board will not have exclusive power through the building of a resume nor in the interview process. The Florida School Board Association will work with the community and a committee of involved citizens to filter the hiring process to a small selection of 3-5 applicants for the board to make the final selection. This process will eliminate any potential political influence. The School Board and Superintendent would be bound to uphold Florida Statute, Department of Education rules, Local Policies and Procedures, and a contract between the Superintendent and the board, thus eliminating "supreme power" of the Board over the Superintendent.

(3). We cannot afford to pay more for a Superintendent.

The current base salary for an elected Superintendent is \$94,000 plus pension, insurance, education development, travel expenses, mileage, social security, Medicare, etc. as mandated by the state. If our Superintendent were hired, we could negotiate the salary and contract.

- (4). We have more accountability with an elected Superintendent.
- With the new process, accountability would be more defined because the School Board will be held responsible for the governance and the Superintendent would be able to give full attention to administration and school improvement instead of running for election every four years. (5). Why can't we just change the requirement for Superintendent and raise our qualifications? The Florida Legislature is the only governing body that has the power to change the state qualifications.
- (6). Why not find a qualified Franklin County resident to run for the position? Some qualified individuals that we have asked are reluctant to run for the position because (1). They are not life-long residents and feel they would not be elected through (See Superintendent, Page 4)

popular vote, (2). The expense related to campaigning, (3). They are unwilling to run based on the politics that would restrict them from making important CEO decisions over our \$23 million budget, managing over 200 staff (including contracts), overseeing the facility, and staying current on laws and deadlines that affect the overall function of the school.
