Jenna holds a Bachelor's degree in Marine and Freshwater Biology and a Master's degree in Fisheries Biology from the University of New Hampshire. She has worked for DEP for over 12 years. Since 2008, Jenna has been the Reserve's Research Coordinator and Assistant Manager, supervising projects focusing on oysters, salt marshes, fish and invertebrate communities, sea turtles, water quality and climate - on top of collaborating with

visiting universities and agencies on a variety of both local and regional projects. She can be reached at 850-670-7700. The Apalachicola National Estuarine Research Reserve was designated in 1979. It is located in Franklin, Gulf and Calhoun counties, within one of the least populated coastal areas of the state. The Apalachicola River basin is only part of the larger Apalachicola-Chattahoochee-Flint River system (ACF) which drains an area covering approximately 19,600 miles, extending into the Blue Ridge Mountains. The Florida portion contains about 2,800 square miles and the population within Florida's basin is probably less than 100,000 individuals. The boundary of ANERR includes the lower 52 miles of the Apalachicola River and floodplain, as well as most of Apalachicola Bay. It includes lands managed by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS), FloridaFish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), Florida Park Service, Northwest Florida Water Management District (NWFWMD) and the Florida Coastal Office. Of the uplands acreage within ANERR, The Florida Coastal Office manages 6,794 acres, the USFWS manages 11,938 acres (St. Vincent Island National Wildlife Refuge), the Florida Park Service manages 2,024 acres (St. George Island State Park), FWC manages 63,814 acres and NWFWMD manages 36,241 acres. The balance of the total acreage is open water, including Apalachicola Bay Aquatic Preserve (80.875 acres).

Incorporation Efforts for SGI Put on Hold

The St George Island (SGI) Growth Management Committee has spent a year researching, gathering feedback, and developing documents for an application package to the Florida Legislature to consider an Incorporation Referendum for SGI. The committee's focus was not to be pro or con on the issue of incorporation, but rather to bring the issue to a vote - that is, to hold the Incorporation Referendum.

Newt Colston recently made a presentation

to the Franklin County Commission regarding incorporating St. George Island into the Village of SGI.

Pinki Jackel introduced a motion to send a letter of support to the state, but it died for lack of a second.

After the presentation by the committee and after the committee left the meeting, a local SGI businessman asked the Commission if they would support incorporation.

Commissioner Parrish moved to state that the board is against incorporation and the motion passed unanimously.

Non-support by Franklin County is a major impediment to a successful implementation of Government Lite on SGI. It appears that further pursuit of incorporation might place SGI in a precarious position wherein the County could cease services and/or charge SGI residents additional county taxes. Until such time as SGI residents are prepared to fund a full municipal incorporation (i.e., SGI law enforcement, roads, mosquito control, full administrative offices, etc.), the committee recommends no further pursuit of the Incorporation Referendum.

Where Do I Plant new growth?

The warm weather and sunny skies are here to stay for a while. Outdoor activities are on the top of many lists of Franklin County residents for chores, and fun.

It is true the lawn has to be mowed now, but it is better, much better, than trudging through snowy slush. Fishing on a lake with thinning ice is marginally better than (See New Growth, Page Three)

contracting cabin fever, however a walk in on the beach is a much more palatable choice

For many, this is the time of year to identify locations in the home landscape where additional shrubs or trees should be installed. Many potted ornamental plants are currently blooming so selection of the preferred color is simplified.

A trip to the nursery will likely result in purchases favored by the homeowner which will improve the visual quality and unique individualism of their landscape. A few considerations can vastly improve the chances for a successful home horticulture endeavor.

Be sure the plant is in the "right place" in the home landscape. This concept includes the plant's final size, light and soil requirements, and other necessities for healthy growth and development. Some plants need full sun exposure to grow and develop. Without the solar rays these plants and trees will languish in the shade and eventually expire without ever fulfilling their potential.

Likewise, shade loving plants will quickly fail in the scalding light of full sun exposure. Partial to total shade will deliver the filtered light necessary for these plants to prosper and deliver their lush foliage.

A range of soil conditions will drastically affect the performance of most shrubs, annuals and trees. An excellent starting point is to soil test the proposed planting area.

The soil test report will provide details on what nutrients are available, and the acidity or alkalinity of the soil. Many currently popular shrubs and annuals will develop completely only in acidic soils. Proximity to the coast increases the possibility that soils are alkaline. Additionally, many homes of masonry or concrete construction have cement or mortar residue in the soil next to the structure.

Cement and mortar are primarily lime, which raises the soils alkalinity as it degrades. The homeowner will need to take corrective action to assure success with acid loving plants.

Soil density can be another factor which should be considered. Sandy soils dry out quickly and can be a problem for plants which demand a consistently moist growing media

Likewise, dense soils or those with high levels of organic matter which hold water will be a challenge for shrubs needing a dryer environment. Fungal disease issues will quickly arise and defeat the owner's efforts.

Terminal plant size and shape are a consideration with long term consequences. Determine the room which will be needed for the mature plant.

Perennial shrubs planted next to a home may provide a "finished look" today, but can prematurely lead to the plants demise in five years. Trees planted too close to structures or under power lines will require excessive trimming and likely die prematurely. While color of blooms and leaves is a consideration during the purchase of plants and trees, be sure the plants needs can be met, too. Everyone will be happier in the long run.

charming side streets that sequester special treasures, Apalachicola has some very exceptional treats in store for its spring tour of homes. The many renovations and restorations currently underway among the city's residences and businesses attest to community as well as personal pride. This year the houses run the gamut from imposing two-story homes to quaint cottages of yesteryear and new construction. The featured house for the 2015 tour is the home of Anne and Clint Eason. One of the most stately homes on Ave. C this Queen Anne-style home, constructed of local pine and black cypress, dates back to 1892. Interestingly, it was erected on the site of the former county jail. Built by local merchant Rudolph Collins, the house later became known as the Lovett house for the many decades that this large family shared these living quarters. Anne Eason comments that "This is the Collins/ Lovett house. We are blessed to be custodians. Nurturing feelings envelop us here." In the year 2000, the house was fully restored by local contractor, Bill Barnes, for former owner, Beverly Austin. The following year it was honored with the Florida State Chrysalis Award for Historic Preservation. There are many wonderful architectural details in the home including the original gingerbread, doors, fireplaces and windows. The kitchen and a room upstairs have been added, yet the integrity of the original home has been

maintained. The house is enhanced by the Eason's comfortable and inviting decor and their use of a mixture of antiques and contemporary and custom-built pieces. Art work abounds from whimsical paintings and sculpture to spectacular woodcarvings and pottery by Anne Eason herself. The stylish chicken coop in the back garden houses a variety of exotic poultry. Visitors to the house will find much to delight them in this home.

Evensong service at Trinity Episcopal Church will be held on Friday, May 1 at 5:30 p.m. This service provides the traditional opening for the home tour. It will be followed by a reception to which all are invited. Homes will be open only on Saturday, May 2, from 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Pre-sale tickets will be available at \$20 until the day of the event. On Saturday, May 2, ticket sales will begin at 9:30 a.m. at \$25 per ticket. A gourmet lunch will be served at Benedict Hall on the grounds of Trinity Church from 11:00 a.m.- 1:30 p.m. during the tour. In addition, a silent auction, 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m., will be a part of Saturday's festivities.

ANERR Workshop: Living Shorelines

The Apalachicola National Estuarine Research Reserve (ANERR) will host a workshop on Living Shorelines on Friday, May 15, 9:30-11:30 am. The workshop will be held in conjunction with the St George Island Plantation Homeowners' Association at the St George Island Plantation Clubhouse. Zach Schang with the Northwest Florida Aquatic Preserves Office in Pensacola will talk about living shorelines vs. harden shorelines. He will discuss how to evaluate a shoreline by considering the physical factors such as wave energy, prevailing wind and wave direction, vegetation, and soil type. He will also present living shoreline methods, materials, permitting, and share success stories of local living shorelines.

Coastal erosion is a natural process. It is caused by currents, wave action, wind, storms and even boat wakes. The traditional use of harden methods like seawalls and rip rap can often increase coastal erosion in neighboring properties and remove the ability of the shoreline to carry out natural processes. Alternatively, living shorelines use plants, sand, and limited use of oyster shells or rock to provide shoreline protection and maintain valuable habitat that stabilizes the shoreline, protects the surrounding riparian and intertidal environment, increases water quality via filtration of upland run-off, and creates habitat for aquatic and terrestrial species. 4th Saturday Paddle

Join Apalachicola Riverkeeper for a volunteer-led 4th Saturday Paddle on Saturday, May 23. We'll explore one of the many creeks or tributaries of the mighty Apalachicola River, and sometimes the mighty Apalachicola River itself. Most of these trips are suitable for paddlers of manydifferent levels of skill and experience. Just let us know what your level is, and we'll almost always be able to accommodate you. On those rare occasions that require more skill, we'll suggest a future trip that's more suitable.

We have kayaks available on "first-reserve, first-get basis." Each one-person kayak includes a PFD (personal floatation device) and paddle. If you bring your own kayak, don't forget your paddle and PFD, which must be worn at all times while on the water. Please plan to reserve your space (and your kayak, if needed) at least two days in advance. Reservations for 4th Saturday Paddle trips can be requested by email or by calling the Apalachicola Riverkeeper office at 850-653-8936. Prior to the paddle, the trip organizer will contact paddlers and provide them with additional details (time, point of departure, weather uncertainties, etc.). Paddle trips are FREE to our members, and \$30 each to non-members (which gives you an annual membership for your family, so any other trips are free for 1 full year). Don't forget to bring: water; snacks/lunch; sunscreen; bug spray; hat; camera; and any other items you might want/need, and all in a water proof bag which can be secured to the boat.
