The first July Full Moon Climb at the Cape St. George Lighthouse will be held on Wednesday, July 1. The Sunset/Full Moon Climb will take place from 8:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. and will include light hors d'oeuvres and a sparkling cider toast to the full moon. Cost is \$15.00 for the general public and \$10.00 for members of the St. George Lighthouse Association.

The sun will set at 8:44 p.m. and the "Buck" moon will rise at 8:21 p.m. on July 1. Bucks generally begin to grow new antlers in the month of July. Full moon names were created by Native American tribes, specifically the Algonquins, to keep track of the seasons. There will be a second full moon on July 31.

Turtle Talk

Join ANERR every Wednesday in July and August, from 2:00-3:00pm. /the dates are July, 8,15,22,29 and August 5,12,19,26. Apalachicola National Estuarine Research Reserve will offer free weekly talks about sea turtles, their nesting habits, how the nests are identified, protected and how visitors and residents can help sea turtles have a successful nesting season, on Wednesdays at 2:00 PM.

During the first week of May, sea turtle nests have been spotted on both St George Island and St. Vincent Island and volunteers and staff are monitoring remaining area beaches for their crawls. Each spring hundreds of these grand creatures arise from Gulf waters to lay their eggs on our sandy shores. Most of the turtles that nest here are Loggerheads, but we do get some Green sea turtles and Leatherback sea turtles. laid and continue to emerge through October. On average there are 90 nests on Little St George and 150 nests on St. George every year.



Bruce Drye has been monitoring turtle nesting on St. George since 1990 after he retired from the St. George Island State Park. At first a volunteer, he was later hired by ANERR to oversee the project each year. Bruce started the ANERR St. George Island Volunteer Turtlers which also help monitor the nests.

Two interns will be working with Bruce this season. Amy Bergstrom from the Milwaukee, Wisconsin area has been an intern at both the Racine Zoo and at the Milwaukee County Zoo, and Kallie Gannon, a senior at Eastern Michigan University, earning her bachelor's degree in Environmental Science.

Little St. George Island has been monitored by ANERR staff since 1988. Megan Lamb with NOAA's Environmental Cooperative Science Center has been assisting with turtle nesting on Little St. George since 2004, and overseeing the beach since 2009.

Apalachicola Independence Eve Celebration



Apalachicola has big plans for a memorable Independence Eve celebration on its riverfront. For the fourth consecutive year, the community has combined its resources for a July 3 spectacular, culminating in a stunning fireworks display over the Apalachicola River.

Beginning at 4 p.m. in Riverfront Park, hub of the Independence Eve activities, a crew from among more than 50 volunteers will be busy serving up Firecracker Fried Shrimp, Wings of Freedom, and Hero Hot Dogs. Refreshments including wine and locally brewed Oyster City Beer will also be available.

Children will take part in face painting, games and age-appropriate fun for America's birthday weekend. There'll be lots of musical entertainment, including the United Methodist Church youth band and soloist Maxine Kellogg.

At 6 p.m. the featured entertainment, Johnny Barbato and the Lucky Doggs, out of New Orleans, will take the stage at Riverfront Park. At 6:30 p.m, across from the historic district in Lafayette Park, the Red, White and Blue parade, coordinated by Franklin's Promise, will line up, drawing conveyances from walkers to wheelchairs, bicycles to golf carts, all emblazoned in red, white and blue. The parade heads down Avenue B to Riverfront Park, where everyone is invited to enjoy free hand-scooped ice cream. The patriotic party continues as the excitement grows, leading to a Veterans Tribute at 8:30 p.m. Apalachicola city commissioner Jimmy Elliott, who served with the Army overseas in Vietnam, Operation Desert Storm and three tours in Operation Iraqi Freedom, will be the featured speaker.

Debbie Fletcher will sing the God Bless America and immediately afterwards, a 20-minute fireworks extravaganza, launched by PyroShows, of LaFollette, Tennessee will be launched from a barge, illuminating the river that once served as the height of Florida commerce during its 19th century heyday. For those who wish to relax in an up-close seat on the docks, savoring wine or locally brewed Oyster City Beer, table sponsorships and reserved seating are available. 
4th of July Freedom Fest



4th Saturday Paddle

Join Apalachicola Riverkeeper for a volunteer-led 4th Saturday Paddle on Saturday, July 25. We'll explore one of the many creeks or tributaries of the mighty Apalachicola River, and sometimes the mighty Apalachicola River itself. Most of these trips are suitable for paddlers of many different levels of skill and experience. Just let us know what your level is, and we'll almost always be able to accommodate you. On those rare occasions that require more skill, we'll suggest a future trip that's more suitable.

We have kayaks available on "first-reserve, first-get basis." Each one-person kayak includes a PFD (personal floatation device) and paddle. If you bring your own kayak, don't forget your paddle and PFD, which must be worn at all times while on the water. Please plan to reserve your space (and your kayak, if needed) at least two days in advance. Reservations for 4th Saturday

Paddle trips can be requested by email or by calling the Apalachicola Riverkeeper office at 850-653-8936. Prior to the paddle, the trip organizer will contact paddlers and provide them with additional details (time, point of departure, weather uncertainties, etc.). Paddle trips are FREE to our members, and \$30 each to non-members (which gives you an annual membership for your family, so any other trips are free for 1 full year). Don't forget to bring: water; snacks/lunch; sunscreen; bug spray; hat; camera; and any other items you might want/need, and all in a water proof bag which can be secured to the boat. Make sure you wear clothing that won't weigh you down if it gets wet. There are also occasional Sunday Excursions.

ANERR Workshop: Blue Carbon

Blue Carbon: A Management Tool for the Conservation and Restoration of CoastalWetlands will be offered by the Apalachicola National Estuarine Research Reserve on July 28th, from 8:30 am-4:30 pm at 108 Island Dr., Eastpoint. Leading Blue Carbon experts Steve Emmett-Mattox with Restore America's Estuaries and Dr. Stephen Crooks will explore the greenhouse gas benefits provided by tidal wetlands, salt marshes, seagrasses, mangroves, and other coastal ecosystems, and how these concepts can be used to support land conservation and restoration goals, plus generate new revenue opportunities. They will discuss the economics of blue carbon, the basics of coastal landscape project planning, models, and implementation practices, and the benefits of combining blue carbon projects with traditional conservation and restoration activities.

This workshop is intended for anyone interested in coastal conservation and restoration, including natural resource managers, land owners, land trust managers, policy makers, planners, real estate professionals, attorneys and financial advisors, academia, and federal, state and local officials.

Presenters include Steve Emmett-Mattox and Dr. Stephen Crooks. Mr. Emmett-Mattox is the Senior Director for Strategic Planning and Programs for Restore America's Estuaries, where he leads the U.S. blue carbon effort and has been developing strategic initiatives for 15 years. Dr. Crooks is the Director of Climate Change Services for Environmental Science Associates, Co-Chair of the International Blue Carbon Working Group and member of the IPCC Working Group that drafted the 2013 guidelines to include wetlands in national greenhouse gas inventories.
