December Meeting reviewed 2015

President Chris Jensen went over several activities held in 2015. The highlight was the number of donations that were made to Franklin County charities. We sent a total of \$15,953 in contributions broken down below:

We also made a \$2000 gift to improve the Volunteer Fire Department's gravel driveway and \$953 to purchase additional portable air conditioning units and tables for the Fire House meeting room where the civic club holds meetings and Bingo.

favorite landmark of the island. Today the location has an enlarged oyster shell base area perfect for family photos, landscaping of native plants with irrigation if needed, and county-maintained pine straw mulch to give the area a more finished appearance. This year the Civic Club was able to add these two benches that will enable visitors and residents to enjoy this overlook with beautiful bay views.

ARETE Industries, a Florida-based company which produces commercial grade outdoor furniture and signage, manufactured the benches on behalf of the Civic Club and reduced their pricing by donating one of the benches for free. These traditional style benches are constructed of recycled plastic in "Sand" color that have the look of painted wood but without the maintenance. The recycled material does not splinter, crack, chip, peel or rot and is resistant to corrosive substances, insects, fungi, salt spray and other environmental stresses. The contoured seating, with slatted back, seat and arm rests, is designed for high traffic park and playground areas. The benches are assembled with commercial grade stainless steel hardware with additional protective and cosmetic coating. Civic Club volunteers will affix these benches to a concrete base to protect from flooding and vandalism.
