Pinki Jackel and Rick Watson speak at February Meeting

Franklin County Supervisor of Elections Pinki Jackel and Franklin County District One Commissioner Rick Watson spoke about actions that affect Islanders at the February Civic Club meeting. Pinki addressed the upcoming Florida Presidential Preference Primary by talking about deadlines for switching parties before an election. If someone wants to move from one party affiliation to another, it must be done at least 29 days before that election. The date to change affiliation to another party before the upcoming primary has passed. She said around 100 Franklin County voters switched from No Party Affiliation (or Independent) to either Democrat or Republican for this primary. Early voting for the primary begins on March 5 and the primary is March 15. Rick addressed items that may affect the Island, including improving Island Drive in Eastpoint. He talked about how much money the bed tax brought into Franklin County from renters enjoying our coast. Pinki was chosen by Gov. Rick Scott to complete the time remaining in the position due to the resignation and death of former Supervisor Ina Elliot and Rick was chosen by Gov. Scott to replace Pinki.

Full Moon Climb at Cape St. George Lighthouse

The March Full Moon Climb at the Cape St. George Lighthouse on St. George Island will be held on Wednesday, March 23. The Sunset/Full Moon Climb will take place from 7:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and will include light hors d'oeuvres and a sparkling cider toast to the full moon. Cost is \$15.00 for the general public and \$10.00 for members of the St. George Lighthouse Association. The sun will set at 7:53 p.m. and the "Worm" moon will rise at 8:14 p.m. on March 23. The March full moon is called the Worm moon because as the snows melt and the ground thaws, earthworms begin to appear and the robins of spring are not far behind. Full Moon names are attributable to Native American tribes, most notably the Algonquin, who named the moons to mark the changing seasons.

After sunset, people are invited to climb to the top of the lighthouse for a breathtaking view of the full moon, as space and time permit. Cost is \$10.00 for the general public and \$5.00 for SGLA members.

The Cape St. George Light is located in St. George Lighthouse Park at the center of St. George Island, where Island Drive (the road off the bridge) ends at Gulf Beach Drive. Parking is available in lots at either side of the park.

Fifth Annual SGI Tour of Homes

The fifth annual St. George Island Tour of Homes held on February 13 was the most successful event yet.

Seven distinctive and beautiful homes were featured along with the Cape St. George Lighthouse and Keeper's House, and the St. George Plantation Clubhouse. This year, over 700 people bought tickets and the Lighthouse made about \$15,000. The Tour weekend began with a kick-off event on Friday, February 12, featuring a special presentation, refreshments, cash bar, and door prizes. Josh Hodson, manager of the St. George Island State Park, spoke about the scenic and award-winning park's wildlife and other amenities. This event was held at the Jay Abbott Firehouse on the Island.

After the Tour, a party was held at Sometimes It's Hotter for all the volunteers who spent their Saturday selling tickets, driving, being docents at each home and various other duties.

The success of the Tour is directly attributable to the generosity of the homeowners, the dedication of more than 100 volunteers, the financial support of the Sponsors and Supporters, and the hard work of Lighthouse and Gift Shop staff. SGLA is a non-profit Florida corporation organized to preserve, maintain and promote the Cape St. George Lighthouse. The Lighthouse was reconstructed in 2008 after collapsing in 2005. SGLA also built a replica of the Lighthouse Keeper's House which includes a museum and gift shop. Funds raised by SGLA are used for the ongoing maintenance of the Lighthouse, the Keeper's House and Lighthouse Park, and this year will help fund a new exhibit featuring a replica of the Cape St. George Light's third order Fresnel lens. 
FSU Lecture: Digging in the Dark

FSU Marine Lab Hosts Paleoindian Lecture March 10. Digging in the Dark: How Submerged Paleoindian Sites Are Illuminating First American Studies. The Florida State University (FSU) Coastal and Marine Laboratory will host a lecture on submerged Paleoindian sites in the region on March 10. The lecture by Dr. Jessi Halligan will be held at the Turkey Point facility east of Carrabelle at 7 pm. Dr. Halligan will share her research conducted over the past several years and share lifestyle discoveries of Florida's early Paleoindians. According to Dr. Halligan "we still have many questions about the earliest Paleoindians. Research (See FSU, Page Four)

conducted during the past five years, however, has begun to provide some significant new insights. She and her collaborators have been conducting geoarchaeological investigations at numerous Paleoindian sites in Florida since 2008. Due to the excellent preservation found in Florida's underwater contexts, they have been able to clarify the archaeological context of several sites, make predictions about preserved Paleoindian site locations in this area, provide some tantalizing hints about the colonization of the Americas, and make some comments on the lifestyle of Florida's early Paleoindians." Dr. Jessi Halligan (FSU, Dept. of Anthropology) is an assistant professor in her first semester at FSU. She is a geoarchaeologist and Paleoindian archaeologist who specializes in submerged and coastal settings. Dr. Halligan has been working in Florida sinkholes since 2007, and received her PhD from Texas A&M in 2012. The FSU Marine lab is located at 3618 Coastal Highway 98, St. Teresa. The parade line-up begins on 10th Street West at 9:30 a.m. EST with the parade starting at 10:45 a.m. EST. The event kicks off on Friday, March 11, with a veterans social at the Camp Gordon Johnston American Legion Post 82 in Lanark Village. The social is open to all veterans with one guest or widows of WWII veterans. On Saturday evening March 12th, there will be a dinner/dance. The parade will include the Military Vehicle Preservation Association (MVPA), 1st Florida Chapter's extensive lineup of military vehicles. They will join other local community groups and associations— the parade is open to all groups, military or civilian, who want to participate in the true spirit of American freedom. placed on display on Hwy 98 at the old Gulf State Bank. There will be plenty of parking available and the "meet and swap" groups will be able to set up shop at that location. Carrabelle is 100 miles east of Panama City on Hwy 98, and about 60 miles south of Tallahassee.

The WWII Army camp engulfed over 275,000 acres and was a major U.S. Army Amphibious Training Base. Many that participated in the D-Day landings trained at Camp Gordon Johnston. It is a fun day for all veterans, families and friends attending, even a few WWII vets that went through the training here will be available to tell their stories. All civic, church, law enforcement, military, educational, etc. groups are welcome to include themselves in our parade. FOLK FANTASTIC - The Collection of Lee and Randy Sewell Featuring Charlie "The Tin Man" Lucas Exhibited folk art from February 04 – April 02

Long before self-taught artists' works entered the collectable hot zone, Lee and Randy Sewell had welcomed hundreds of handmade creations into their Atlanta and St. George Island homes. Randy began collecting contemporary folk art at estate sales. He has hundreds of whirligigs, decorative objects that spin in the wind, and hundreds of birdhouses. For fun, Randy builds fanciful birdhouses shaped like quirky American roadside attractions that popped up in the '40s and '50s: chili bowl-shaped restaurants. aluminum-sided diners, and more. Lee enjoys rustling through flea markets but isn't as prodigious a collector as Randy. Even at sixty miles an hour, Randy Sewell can spot American folk art. He scours lawns telltale signs of the self-taught artist: whitewashed tire fencing, painted tree trunks, or funky garden ornaments. A collector since the '70s, Randy purchased some of his twig furniture collection right off people's front porches. His collection includes miniature twig chairs, probably made as doll furniture. Sometimes, repeat visits are needed to seal a deal. But by that (See Folk Fantastic, Page Seven)

point, Randy has collected more than folk art, he is connected with another artist.

Many of Charlie Lucas's sculptures stand along a rural road and in the fields around his house. His art is a convergence of the techniques of the blacksmith, the quilter, and the basket maker in his life. He is a modern day root sculpture. But because the hands of his male antecedents bent, twisted, and hammered horseshoes, wagon wheels, and automobile engines, Lucas's creations grow from the junk heaps of the industrial age. Charlie Lucas Born in 1951, said, "I only bring metal home that I see something in. I don't just collect junk, I look for pieces with character in them, and they show themselves to me." His art was exhibited at the Mint Gallery in Atlanta in Feb and March of 2015.
