"Beaver" moon will rise at 6:54 p.m. The November full moon is called the Beaver moon because beavers are preparing for winter, Native Americans set beaver traps to ensure a supply of warm winter furs before the swamps freeze over. Full Moon names are attributable to Native American tribes, most notably the Algonquin, who named the moons to mark the changing seasons.

After sunset, people are invited to climb to the top of the lighthouse for a breathtaking view of the full moon, as space and time permit. Cost is \$10.00 for the general public and \$5.00 for SGLA members.

## **Oysters 101**

Learn about the famous bivalves of

Apalachicola Bay on Friday, Nov. 17. This, class offered by the Apalachicola National Estuarine Research Reserve, will teach you all about the role that oysters play in the health of Apalachicola Bay. Discover



what makes the bay so ideal for growing oysters, what gives our oysters their distinct flavor, and how oyster bars benefit the ecosystem. After spending some time in the classroom, participants will get the chance to walk along an oyster bar, and look at its inhabitants under a microscope. This class is full of opportunities to learn more about the animals that live in our bay and along the tidal flats. Registration is required and the cost is \$25 per person. Ken Horne is a talented musician and walking fountain of knowledge about Florida history & folk lore. He is a teacher in Leon County and a former educator for the Florida History Museum.

Gibby Conrad is a pioneer of ecotourism on the Apalachicola Estuary, a lifelong student of Gulf Coast maritime history and a former museum educator. He has conducted tours on the Apalachicola River and Bay for over 10 years.
